

The Census Act of 1790 established the concept of “usual residence” as the main principle in determining where people should be counted, and this concept has been followed in all subsequent censuses.

Definition: Usual Residence has been defined as the place where a person lives and sleeps most of the time.

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

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
Every decade, the Census Bureau undertakes a review of the decennial residence criteria and residence situations to ensure that the concept of usual residence is applied as intended.

10 Most Common Situations



Residence Rule

The Residence Rule is used to determine where people should be counted during the 2020 Census. The Rule says:

- ❑ Count people at their usual residence, which is the place where they live and sleep most of the time.
- ❑ People in certain types of facilities or shelters (*i.e.*, places where groups of people live together) on Census Day should be counted at the facility or shelter.
- ❑ People who do not have a usual residence, or cannot determine a usual residence, should be counted where they are on Census Day.

Visitors on Census Day

- *Visitors on Friday, April 1st who will return to their usual residence . . . **Counted at the residence where they live and sleep most of the time.***
- *Citizens of foreign countries who are visiting the U.S. on Friday, April 1st, such as on a vacation or a business trip . . . **Not counted in the census.***

Rule #4 – People Living Outside the United States



People Living Outside the United States

*People stationed or assigned outside the United States on Census Day who are military or civilian employees of the U.S. government, as well as their dependents living with them outside the United States—***Counted as part of the U.S. federally affiliated overseas population**, using administrative data provided by federal agencies.

People living outside the United States on Census Day who are not military or civilian employees of the U.S. government and are not dependents —
Not counted in the stateside census.

Rule #5 – People Who Live or Stay in More Than One Place



People Who Live or Stay in More Than One Place

People living away most of the time while working, such as people who live at a residence close to where they work and return regularly to another residence—

Counted at the residence where they live and sleep most of the time. If they cannot determine a place where they live most of the time, they are counted where they are staying on Census Day.

This includes people who travel seasonally “snowbirds” and children in shared custody or other arrangements.

Rule #6 – People Moving Into or Out of Residence Around Census Day



People Moving Into or Out of a Residence Around Census Day

- (a) *People who move into a new residence on or before Census Day—Counted at the new residence where they are living on Census Day.*
- (b) *People who move out of a residence on Census Day and do not move into a new residence until after Census Day—Counted at the old residence where they were living on Census Day.*
- (c) *People who move out of a residence before Census Day and do not move into a new residence until after Census Day—Counted at the residence where they are staying on Census Day*

The Residence Rule Applied

Rule #7 – People Who Are Born or Die Around Census Day



People Who Are Born or Who Die Around Census Day

- (a) *Babies born on or before Census Day—*
Counted at the residence where they will live and sleep most of the time, even if they are still in a hospital on Census Day.
- (b) *Babies born after Census Day—***Not counted in the census.**
- (c) *People who die before Census Day—***Not counted in the census.**
- (d) *People who die on or after Census Day—*
Counted at the residence where they were living and sleeping most of the time as of Census Day.

Rule #8 – Relatives and Nonrelatives



Relatives and Nonrelatives

- ✓ *Foster children*
- ✓ *Spouses and close relatives, such as parents or siblings*
- ✓ *Extended relatives, such as grandparents, nieces/nephews, aunts/uncles, cousins, or in-laws—Unmarried partners*
- ✓ *Housemates or roommates*
- ✓ *Roomers or boarders*
- ✓ *Live-in employees, such as caregivers or domestic workers*
- ✓ *Other nonrelatives, such as friends—*

Counted at the residence where they live and sleep most of the time. If they cannot determine a place where they live most of the time, they are counted where they are staying on Census Day.

The Residence Rule Applied

Rule #10 – College Students



College Students and Staff Living in College Housing

- (a) *College students living at their parents' or guardians' home while attending college in the United States—*
Counted at their parents' or guardians' home.
- (b) *College students living away from their parents' or guardians' home while attending college in the United States (living either on-campus or off-campus)—*
Counted at the on-campus or off-campus residence where they live and sleep most of the time.
- (c) *College students who are U.S. citizens living outside the United States while attending college outside the United States—*
Not counted in the stateside census.

Rule #15 – People in Correctional Facilities for Adults



People in Correctional Facilities for Adults

- People in federal and state prisons on Census Day*
- People in local jails and other municipal confinement facilities on Census Day*
- People in federal detention centers on Census Day*
- People in correctional residential facilities on Census Day, such as halfway houses, restitution centers, and prerelease, work release, and study centers*

Residents are counted at the facility. Staff members are counted at the residence where they live and sleep most of the time.

Rule #18 – People in Transitory Locations



People in Transitory Locations

People at transitory locations such as recreational vehicle (RV) parks, campgrounds, hotels and motels, hostels, marinas, racetracks, circuses, or carnivals—

Anyone, including staff members, staying at the transitory location is **counted at the residence where they live and sleep most of the time.**

If they do not have a usual home elsewhere, or they cannot determine a place where they live most of the time, they are counted at the transitory location.
