Lake County Updates

- As of yesterday, the United States officially surpassed 300,000 total deaths from COVID-19.
 The U.S. now averages over 200,000 new cases per day. https://covid.cdc.gov/covid-data-tracker/
- Lake County has had 42,098 confirmed COVID-19 cases, 2,121 probable cases, and 681 deaths.
 Over 526,000 tests have been administered. Lake County's recovery rate is 97 percent.

- The Health Department continues to work closely with long-term care facilities to prevent the spread of disease among this vulnerable population. Currently we are assisting 62 facilities with 2 or more cases reported. Over the course of the pandemic, over 141 facility outbreaks have resulted in 3,470 cases and 404 deaths.
- After careful review of the CDC's <u>new options</u> for shortened quarantine, our health department continues to recommend a full 14-day quarantine for those who are exposed to someone with COVID-19 in Lake County. The Health Department will reassess the quarantine recommendations after the holidays.
- Take steps to slow the spread of COVID-19. Wear a mask, wash your hands often, watch your distance keeping at least 6 feet apart and avoid crowds. The more steps you take, the more you are protected against COVID-19.
- The safest way to celebrate winter holidays is to celebrate at home with the people who live
 with you. Staying home is the best way to protect yourself and others. Travel and gatherings
 with family and friends who do not live with you can increase your chances of getting or
 spreading COVID-19 or the flu. https://lakecohealth.org/holidays
- IDPH recommends that any residents returning from holiday gatherings get tested for COVID19. If a person has symptoms, they should get tested right away. If they do not have symptoms, they should wait 5-7 days after their last day of potential exposure to get tested. Anyone who gets tested should quarantine and not leave home while they wait for their test results.
- The entire state remains in Tier 3 mitigation. https://coronavirus.illinois.gov/s/restore-illinois-mitigation-plan. In Region 9, our testing positivity rate has decreased to 11.2%, our med-surg bed availability is currently 22.8% and ICU bed availability is 26.8%, and we have seen decreases in hospitalizations in 8 out of the past 10 days. Our region now meets the state's criteria for moving from Tier 3 to Tier 2 mitigation, and we are awaiting news as to the timing of any changes. - Lake County continues to be listed as orange 'warning' level on the Illinois Department of
 Public Health county-level map, indicating increased COVID-19 risk. We have been at orange

- It is not too late to get your annual flu vaccination. The CDC recommends every person over

- On December 11, the FDA authorized the Pfizer COVID-19 vaccine for emergency use. The Advisory Committee on Immunization Practices met on December 12 and approved the use of the vaccine for individuals 16 years old and older.
- Tomorrow, December 17, the FDA will be discussing the application and clinical trial data for the COVID-19 vaccine manufactured by Moderna.

- Lake County is expected to receive our first vaccine in the next couple of days. This supply will
 initially go to our hospitals. The early supply of COVID-19 vaccine will focus on vaccinating our
 frontline healthcare workers and residents and staff of long-term care facilities as
 recommended by the CDC. As more vaccine becomes available, more individuals will have the
 opportunity to receive the vaccine, in order of priority determined by the CDC.
- Last week, our Health Department launched the Lake County AllVax Portal, where people can register themselves and their households for COVID-19 vaccination. Registering is free, easy, and secure. https://AllVax.lakecohealth.org
 - o In just one week, over 113,000 residents have registered on the portal.
 - By providing basic information and answering a few screening questions, you will be notified when a COVID-19 vaccine is available. Then you will be able to schedule an appointment at a Lake County Health Department vaccination clinic.
 - Residents who need assistance registering can call (847) 377-8130 or email <u>AllVax@lakecountyil.gov</u>.
 - The screening questions used during registration are based on CDC prioritization of populations for COVID-19 vaccination. As priority groups for future vaccination stages are finalized, the portal will be updated, and people will be able to update their information to ensure the right people receive their vaccine at the right time.
 - Lake County's goal is to vaccinate 80% of our population. We ask for your partnership in sharing this important resource and encouraging anyone who lives or works in Lake County to register.

- LCHD continues its work with two community partnership groups—Asociacion Communitaria Latina (ACL) and the African American Community Partnership Group (AACPG) to address COVID-19 disparities along racial and ethnic lines.
 - We are working closely with our partners to develop culturally tailored outreach materials around the vaccine and will be hosting several events that address our communities' unique concerns in the new year.
 - These groups are actively distributing 83,000 PPE kits for community members. If your

- Demand for testing remains high in Lake County. The Community-Based Testing Site at 102 W. Water St., Waukegan is open to everyone with or without symptoms. The site offers free drive-thru and walk-up testing for those who do not have a vehicle or who use public transportation. The site is open 7 days a week from 8 a.m. until 4 p.m.

Policy

- Illinois has extended the moratorium on evictions through January 11. The moratorium applies only to renters who have earned no more than \$90,000 in annual income, or \$198,000 for joint filers during the calendar year, and are unable to make a full rent or housing payment due to a COVID-19 related hardship. Under the new Executive Order, tenants must complete this declaration and provide it to their landlord to protect themselves from eviction.

Businesses

- In line with guidance from the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC), the Lake County Health Department recommends that employers should not require a negative test for an employee to return to work if that employee previously tested positive for COVID-19. This is because a person may continue to test positive for the virus for months after their infectious period, even though they are no longer contagious.
 - Individuals with COVID-19 or their close contacts who speak with a Health Department Contact Tracer can choose to enroll in a daily health assessment which will provide a release from isolation or quarantine letter from IDPH.
- To date, more than \$16 million dollars has been distributed to just over 1,200 local small businesses as part of the Lake County Small Business Assistance Grants Program. Grant awards ranged from \$485 to a maximum of \$30,000. For a list of the local businesses that have received grants, visit www.lakecountyil.gov/forward.

- ComEd is offering a new bill assistance program to help local small businesses facing financial difficulties as a result of COVID-19. Eligible small business customers that are past due on their energy bills can receive a one-time grant equal to 30 percent of their total ComEd balance (up to \$1,000) for a limited time. - To provide more rapid COVID-19 diagnostic testing, the Health Department is working with IDPH to distribute BinaxNOW™COVID-19 Antigen Card tests to appropriate entities within our community.
 - BinaxNOW™COVID19 Antigen Card tests are antigen tests purchased by the federal government and disseminated to states for distribution. These tests provide more rapid results than PCR diagnostic tests.
 - Entities that are prioritized include schools, higher institutions of learning, correctional facilities, long-term care facilities, federally qualified health centers, essential/critical infrastructure workers, and homeless service providers.

Faith-Based Organizations

- To protect the health and safety of faith leaders, staff, congregants and visitors, religious organizations and houses of worship are strongly encouraged to follow guidance from the Illinois Department of Public Health. - Please encourage everyone to be vigilant about following the 3Ws if you do host any in-person events or services. Keeping a list of attendees and phone numbers can be helpful if attendees are exposed to someone with COVID-19.
- The state reports COVID-19 outbreak locations on its website. Outbreaks are defined as 5 or more cases linked to a common location. Region 9 has had two outbreaks in religious locations since July. http://www.dph.illinois.gov/covid19/outbreak-locations?regionID=0&rPeriod=1
- The state also shared data on potential exposure locations, based on information shared by people diagnosed with COVID-19. These should be interpreted as locations where COVID-19 exposure may have occurred, not definitive exposure locations.
 - In Region 9, there have been 43 cases of COVID-19 where a potential exposure location was a place of worship within the past 30 days.
